


Join us at our December Luncheon

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Recently a local newspaper featured an article about the ERA - entitled *One More Time for the ERA?* The Equal Rights Amendment was crafted in 1923 on the 75th anniversary of the Seneca Falls Convention. It was based on the proposition that women's rights were

broader than just voting rights - which the 19th amendment had guaranteed. In 1972 it was adopted by the Senate, endorsed by President Nixon, and then moved on to the states for ratification. It needed 38 states to ratify it within a seven year period - and it fell short by three!

Almost a century after its proposal, women still don't have a comprehensive and all-inclusive guarantee of equality. What is so problematic about these words? *Equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of sex.* Certainly in today's world, women merit the inclusion of this statement in our Constitution. The issue of true equality is addressed on a state-by-state basis and in a piecemeal manner at the federal level. Surely the time has come, if not for us then for our daughters and granddaughters. Take the time to let your elected officials in Washington know that you want ERA passed.

Why does the ERA matter? At this point, women need the validity and high profile validation that only ratification will bring. Passage of this amendment would guarantee constitutional equality between the sexes. This is a concept that a majority of Americans support. Women have made great strides in achieving equity but only passage of the ERA will cement that for all time. ~ *Eleanor Aronstein*



Support for the Legal Advocacy Fund (LAF) enables AAUW to support plaintiffs who fight gender discrimination and harassment in the workplace and in education. Sex discrimination today takes a variety of forms: unfair pay, pregnancy discrimination, sexual harassment, sexual assault, and violations of Title IX. LAF addresses these barriers by informing people of their rights and using the legal system act justice and change. Through the Legal Advocacy Fund AAUW is able to make an impact.



AAUW promotes the advancement of women in the science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) field of studies. It is one of their policy goals. Since its conception in 1881, this organization has shown a commitment to women achieving a higher education. According to AAUW, "the shortage of American scientists threatens our nation's ability to compete and innovate in the coming years". Statistics show that college educated women earn only eighteen percent of degrees in the areas of

STEM. Very few women earn a degree in computer technology. AAUW statistics point out that very few women earned degrees in the area of computer science.

Cyber security has become extremely important to all of us. It seems that there are constant data breaches in major corporations on a weekly basis. According to AAUW, strengthening our security is paramount. However, this effort is hindered by a shortage our workforce. Statistics reveal that women make up only 26 percent of the workforce in this area. ISC, one of the largest organizations certifying cyber professionals, indicated "women account for just one out of every 10 cyber security professionals. This is down from 11 percent two years ago". Symantec, a cyber security company, donated a \$100,000 grant to AAUW for the purpose of developing a cyber security course for middle school girls who are interested in STEM.

It is important to reach girls in middle school in order to close the gender gap in STEM. If female students become interested in technology in middle school, they will pursue through high school and college. There is a large untapped pool of talent in the United States. Women make up a large portion of this talent pool. AAUW will continue to fight to increase the number of women in these career areas.
