GIRLS, INC AND HOLIDAY VOLUNTEERING

Girls, Inc., is a national organization that helps girls become healthy, educated, and independent – *strong, smart, and bold.* This organization helps girls overcome economic, social, and gender barriers by providing life-changing programs and experiences. Their award-winning, research-based programs cover a broad range of topics including, STEM, education, health, nutrition, pregnancy, and drug use prevention, media, economic literacy, career explorations, and many more.

Girls, Inc,. of the Greater Capital Region is comprised of two centers: Albany and Schenectady. This group has been in operation over 75 years working to meet the developmental and emotional needs of girls ages 5-18. Over 200 girls each day are served in free after-school programs, including *Operation SMART (Science, Math, And Relevant Technology)*, at both centers.

Many local corporate, academic, and community organizations partner with Girls, Inc., to support the work they do. Wouldn't it be wonderful for members of the Schenectady Branch of AAUW to also volunteer their talents and expertise to these girls?

SOCIAL SECURITY MATTERS TO WOMEN

The AAUW is asking its members to call Congress regarding their opposition to slashing social security benefits. "Social security matters for women and girls. The program, which has over 70 years of successes, is one of our nation's best anti-poverty programs and provides critical benefits to millions of children, disabled workers, surviving spouses, and retirees" (AAUW/issues/alerts). Can you imagine a society without these benefits? Half of elderly women would be living in poverty because many of them did not have an opportunity to have retirement accounts. One such woman did live in a society without social security, and she became an advocate for women and children living in poverty. Her name was Jane Addams. She was a pioneer for social reform; and because of her efforts, we enjoy programs such as social security.



Jane was born in Cedarville, Illinois, on September 6, 1860. She was an ardent feminist who believed that women should search out opportunities for their advancement. She graduated from the Rockford Female Seminary in 1881 and traveled extensively through Europe. She attended medical school, but she had to leave her studies because of poor health (women's history.com). Jane is well known for her founding of Hull House, a place for poor women and children. Her work at Hull House was the basis for social work reform (women's history.com). In 1905, Ms. Addams was appointed to the Chicago Board of Education. She was instrumental in organizing the Chicago School of Civics and Philanthropy. Jane became the first woman president of the National Conference of Charities and Corrections. She received the first honorary degree ever awarded to a

woman by Yale University in 1910 (Nobel prize.org).

Jane Addams opposed the United States entrance into WWI, and she was expelled from the Daughters of the American Revolution. Despite this, she organized relief supplies of food for women and children in Europe who were suffering the effects of the war. On December 10, 1931, she was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize for her humanitarian efforts (Nobel prize.org).

If it were not for the efforts of Jane Addams and other courageous women, social reform issues such as social security would not exist today. So take a moment and call your congressmen and senators telling them that Social Security is a "national commitment through which we care for one another across generations, and it is one of the most successful anti-poverty programs in our nation's history" (AAUW/issues/alerts).--Linda Rizzo

THE EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITIES FUND

The Educational Opportunities Fund sponsored by the women of AAUW provides graduate women monetary support "to advance education, research, and self-development." These endowed funds provide grants in career development and community action, as well as professional awards. AAUW fellowships and grants are awarded in five categories: American Fellowships, Career Development Grants, Community Action Grants, International Fellowships, and Selected Professions Fellowships. Listed below are examples of awards granted in each of these five categories:

A 2011-12 *American Fellowship* award was made to Rebecca MacDonald at RPI to study degenerative disc disease that has been correlated to occupations that are mechanical in nature. Her research examines the impact of muscle fatigue on increasing loading in the spine, which can ultimately lead to disc degeneration. She hopes to continue her career in orthopedics and implant design in the future.

A one-year *Career Development Grant* award was made to Stephanie Love, Grand Prairie, Texas, for a Summer STEM Academy. a project-based after-school and summer program geared toward exposing low-income, minority, or reluctant students — especially girls — to science, technology, engineering, and mathematics.

A *Community Action Grant* was given to Jen Stockton, Nevada Outdoor School for a New Horizons Girls Camp. New Horizons presents fifth- and sixth-grade girls with new opportunities for success as confident female leaders through activities which empower girls to consider their future with optimism and enthusiasm, grow as individuals, and develop leadership and communication skills needed to succeed.

An *International Fellowship* was given to Anju Devkota at Brandeis University. After earning degrees in public health and women's studies, Anju Devkota worked as a fellow at the East-West Center's Asia Pacific Leadership Program, which fueled her desire to work in public health. After earning her master's in international health policy and management from Brandeis University, she plans to contribute to women's health and development by working as a policy and decision maker in the Asia-Pacific region.

Selected Professions Fellowships included one for Christina Gamba, Stanford University. A graduate of Princeton University, Christina Gamba is currently pursuing her M.D. at Stanford School of Medicine. The intersection of arts and medicine, as well as women's health, inspired her passion for medicine. She hopes to expand her clinical and evidence-based medical skills during her fellowship year, better preparing her to provide excellent health care to her future patients.

During the 2011-12 academic year, more than 240 grants and fellowships provided women and nonprofit organizations with \$3.7 million in funding. All of this support was made possible through the generous donations of AAUW members.

AAUW has just released a new research report which has gained national attention entitled "Crossing the Line: Sexual Harassment at School." This research on sexual harassment in middle school and high schools finds that many students have experienced some form of sexual harassment during the 2010-11 academic year. presentation by Go to the www.aauw.org site to see the PowerPoint presentation; members can also btain a hard copy from Shop AAUW, or print the PDF version.
