PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

With a snowy winter upon us, we have to look to friends and family for our warmth and sunshine! Reflecting our warmth for each other and our commitment to gender

equality, it is a very cozy moment for me, and it should be for all who share in our goals, our activities, our many outreach efforts.

Let me share a long-cherished memory with you: In 1963, just a year after becoming a mother, I was feeling a bit unfulfilled professionally. Societal pressures kept most young mothers at home back then. My husband recognized signs of restlessness - and he suggested that I get out for an evening and do something interesting. He would take care of the baby! Well, Betty Friedan was speaking at Vassar College in Poughkeepsie (where we lived at that time) and I went to hear Ms. Friedan speak. Wow!!! She was probably the most militant, angry woman I had ever heard. She put some interesting ideas in my rather sheltered head and I must confess that she started me on the long path to self-discovery. We've come a long way since 1963! But we haven't come far enough - and AAUW is one of the principal pushers in this endeavor - to raise the consciousness of girls so that they aspire to realize their full potential, to raise the numbers of women in government so that our political institutions more accurately reflect our numbers, and to provide US with an effective organization within which we can continue to work for greater equality.

I'm proud to say that our Schenectady Branch is working to help prepare young women through our support and involvement in SUNYA's (State University of New York at Albany) AAUW Elect Her Training on January 31st.

As we continue to work (and play) together, I wish you a Happy and Healthy New Year and I look forward to all our good works! ~ *Eleanor Aronstein*

A REVIEW OF AAUW'S PUBLIC POLICY FOR 2014

AAUW is committed to promoting women's issues through its public policy program. It underscores the advancement of equity for women by advocacy, education, philanthropy, and research. "I am woman hear me roar. Numbers too big to ignore," is a concept that helps advance women's causes.

During 2014, the public policy principles for action covered many important issues. Some of these issues included: 1) education advancement of women, 2) affordable housing, health care, and a clean environment, 3) right of privacy, freedom from violence, and reproductive rights, 4) affirmative action, 5) promoting human right and justice internationally, 6) pay equity, 7) protection of social security, 8) vigorous protection of civil and constitutional rights, 9) enforcement of antidiscrimination statutes, 10) condemnation of human trafficking, 11) condemnation of sexual harassment in the military, 12) improvement of retirement benefits for women.

Other priorities included the support of a strong public school system, economic self-sufficiency for all women, and the guarantee of equality, individual rights, and social justice for our diverse society.

Social Security, Medicare, and Medicare will need our continued support in 2015. These entitlement programs serve as essential support for a large segment of our population. These vital programs come under attack from various political groups under the false guise of causing a major budget deficit. In addition, there will be renewed emphasis on pay equity for women. AAUW will again lobby state and national leaders to pass this legislation so that women receive the same pay as men for doing the same job. In addition, AAUW supports a fair and just path to legal status for immigrants residing in the United States. ~ Linda Rizzo

MEMBERSHIP MATTERS!

Important membership reminders as we begin 2015: New members who join at an AAUW public event pay only 50% of national dues! Ergo, each new member pays \$12.25 to national. After March 15, however, branches are asked to focus on the next fiscal year for membership recruitment, so the discount offer becomes moot.

Equally important to remember is that \$46 of the \$49 national dues is **TAX DEDUCTIBLE** by the individual member; \$3 of the national dues payment is not tax deductible because it will be used to support the AAUW Action Fund's Lobby Corps and election-related activities.

CAMPUS WOMEN WIN AUW • RUNNING START Campus Women Win at Four NYS Sites for 2015!

New York will be hosting <u>four</u> sites for AAUW's Elect Her—Campus Women Win trainings! **Ithaca College** and **Stony Brook University** will continue as 2015 Elect Her 2nd year training sites, while **SUNY Albany** and **SUNY Buffalo** have been selected as a new sites. Only 50 colleges from across the nation and Jamaica host Elect Her—Campus Women Win.

Elect Her—Campus Women Win, a collaboration of AAUW and Running Start, is a unique campus-based program that teaches women how to run for elective office and leadership positions.

Its goal is to address the disparity between the high percentage of women in colleges and universities and their low representation in student government by encouraging women to run for campus leadership positions.

This day-long program covers skills such as how to mobilize your constituency, how to craft your message, and how to speak and present yourself confidently as a candidate. By encouraging more women to run for student government during their college years, we are confident that we are preparing more women for local, state, and federal office candidacy.

In 2014, Elect Her-Campus Women Win trained more than 1,000 participants on 50 campuses.

Of the students who reported running for student office after the training, **78% WON!** Approximately 12% more students said they are considering running for political office after the training than before. Plus, 100% of the participants reported that they would recommend Elect Her-Campus Women Win to a friend.



OUR HISTORY IS OUR STRENGTH

Our symposium's theme is "Our History is Our Strength." Longer morning sessions take a then and now approach to topics that we believe were important to women of Elizabeth Cady Stanton's day and remain relevant to women of the 21st century.

SESSION A

Women on the Page. An excerpt from a documentary on the life of the author Louisa May Alcott will set the stage with a picture of the 19th century woman writer. Then three 21st century authors will share their experiences with researching, writing, and getting published today.

Greta Nettleton on her work The Quack's Daughter: A True Story About the Private Life of a Victorian College Girl published in May 2014. What Right did a woman have to a career in the 19th century? How many rights of any kind did she have? Greta will use the case of women physicians in the west as a jumping off point for a discussion of her research and writing.

HeidISprouse on writing romances about ordinary men who become extraordinary through their actions and the women who love them. Hers are small town love stories that could happen anywhere.

Ruth Holland Scott on her memoir The Circles God Draws which describes her remarkable journey from a segregated school to leadership of the Rochester NY City Council.

From Corsets to Spanx[™]. Sue McLane, the Victorian Lady, will demonstrate the ways late 19th century clothing constrained women and dictated a certain body ideal. Video excerpts from the documentary *Killing Me Sofly* will set the stage for a discussion of how modern marketing still promotes unreasonable body images..

Midwifery: The Second Oldest Profession. Through discussion & film excerpts from A Midwife's Tale participants will learn about the history of midwifery as one of the oldest female professions in the U.S. Julie Tesi, a currently practicing midwife in Fulton Co, will discuss the profession today and answer questions.


