The sun is shining, the snow is almost gone - and with spring comes a renewed sense of hope and new sources of energy. Let's take a moment and reflect on what we - AAUW - do that

makes us so special. Our organization has a long and distinguished history of advancing educational and professional opportunities for women in the United States and around the globe. One of the world's largest sources of funding for graduate women, AAUW is providing more than \$3.7 million in funding for more than 244 fellowships and grants to outstanding women and nonprofit organizations in the 2014-15 academic year.

Due to the long-standing, generous contributions of AAUW members, a broader community of women continues to gain access to educational and economic opportunities — breaking through barriers so that all women have a fair chance. Fellowship and grant recipients perform research in a wide range of disciplines and work to improve their schools and communities. #### LEGISLATIVE UPDATE



It appears the New York State Assembly is passing individual bills that were part of the Women's Equality Act. Several elected individuals in the assembly decided that it was more advantageous to bring the bills to individual votes so that the eight did not get "hung up" on the impasse one. Assembly woman Amy Paulin and State Senator Diane Savino were instrumental in pushing for individual votes on the Women's Equality Act.

The human trafficking bill passed the assembly and the abortion bill sponsored by Deborah Glick also passed. However, the abortion bill is D.O.A (dead on arrival) in the State Senate. Last year, the domestic violence bill passed the Legislature and it was signed into law by Governor Cuomo.

Assembly woman Michelle Titus will sponsor the pay equity bill. This bill is expected to be voted on after April 14. It is expected that this bill will be signed into law after it passes in the assembly if it is the same as the bill in the Women's Equality Act. Basically, many elected officials believed that it was an arbitrary political decision that made these bills come together, and it was not a good way to legislate.

Professionally Miriam is the Affirmative Action Manager for Schenectady County and also an adjunct professor at Schenectady County Community College teaching Business Statistics.
