MESSAGE FROM THE BOARD

AAUW - What We Do! Focus on Education

The primary focus of AAUW is working toward policies that empower women and girls, and there is a welldefined mechanism through which is implemented. Members give input in the form of a survey and the results of this survey provide the focus for its Public Policies Priorities agenda.

At this time, AAUW has four major Public Policy Priorities: Civil Rights, Education, Economic Security and title IX. Since many of the Schenectady Chapter members are retired teachers, this article will focus on Education - and specifically, Career and Technical Education.

AAUW supports vocational education and programs which improve career development and earning potential. Women outnumber men in low-wage jobs, making up 57% of workers earning less than \$15 an hour. Conversely, in high wage, high skill jobs, women frequently make up less than 25% of that cohort.

The most important way to help women workers move up to high wage, higher skill jobs is to make sure they have access to the training programs for those jobs. Women, however, face barriers to equity in technical education. Old attitudes linger. A lack of role models is another factor. Proper career counseling may be lacking. And overt discrimination and sexual harassment still act as deterrents.

Therefore, AAUW focuses on holding State and local agencies accountable for improving both access and successful outcomes for women and girls in CTE (Career and Technical Education) and STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Math) programs. AAUW promotes the expansion of public/private collaborations to open new pathways for women . AAUW promotes training to expand teacher/administrator receptivity to encouraging more women to enter non-traditional fields. Teachers and administrators must be trained to create an environment free of harassment and stereotyping.

On a personal note, in 1951 I was put into a Home Economics class and my fellow male 8th graders were put into shop classes! Had I wanted to learn how to use tools, it would not have been possible at that time. Just a few years later, my future Engineering student husband told me that there were exactly TWO women engineering students in his class of approximately 100 students. Times have changed - and hopefully, attitudes have changed, too.... but eternal vigilance is the price of progress. AAUW is at the forefront of providing that vigilance.

RESULTS OF MEMBER SURVEY

At the directive of our Board, a member survey was conducted from October-December, 2018. The purpose was to seek input on our current activities as well as suggestions for branch activities in the future. We were especially interested in hearing ways to increase membership as well as any current barriers to members' participation.

The surveys were distributed via the Study & Interest Group meetings, email, the General Meetings and the December Luncheon. We had a 51% return rate on the surveys (43 out of 85 listed members as of December).

Summary of the Results

General Meetings: the majority (37 respondents) indicated they prefer a variety of topics or a focus on community resources related to social issues. There were several suggestions for presentations which will be followed up on as we develop the 2019-2020 program.

Top Barriers to General Meeting Attendance:

"evening meetings", "need for a ride" and "health related issues".

Interest in Developing New Groups

Movies - 10 votes Walks - 9 votes. Bridge group - 9 votes(either with just members or including spouses/partners).

If you are willing to develop one of these new groups, I can let you know which members are interested.

There were many excellent suggestions for increasing overall branch membership. Those which the Board will focus on initially are joining with other community organizations or regional AAUW branches for joint activities; day trips to cultural venues, luncheon at SCCC culinary program and an AAUW informational table at the Schenectady Green Market

It is noteworthy that although there were many suggestions to reach out to younger women, businesses and college alumni offices, our respondents clearly indicated a preference for daytime activities versus the option for evening or Saturday meetings. This appears to be reflective of the Branch's discrepancy between who we are as a branch as compared to who we want to be.
