2023 National Election

Voting is now open on proposed changes to the Public Policy Priorities recommended by AAUW members. Please use the electronic or paper ballot with your member-specific voting information to vote. **Voting closes on Monday, May 15 at 5:00 pm ET.**

AAUW's Public Policy Priorities, adopted every two years by every-member vote, establish the federal action issues on which AAUW members across the country focus their advocacy efforts and guide the work of the national staff. States and branches should also use the Public Policy Priorities to inform their advocacy efforts on state and local issues.

The strength of the Public Policy Priorities is that they originate and end with the AAUW membership. The AAUW Public Policy Committee (APPC) solicits feedback from members and staff to develop proposed Public Policy Priorities based on viability, critical need, strong member support, and potential for distinctive contribution.

2023-25 AAUW Public Policy Priorities

The Public Policy Priorities underscore AAUW's mission to advance gender equity for women and girls through research, education, and advocacy. The work of AAUW builds upon responsible public participation, and the following priorities provide a basis for AAUW members' actions at the local, state, national, and international levels. Implicit in each is support for government agencies administering programs, including adequate appropriations, effective and accountable administration, and provision for citizen participation. We advocate public discussion to ensure enlightened decisions on these priorities. We work to increase the number of women, and the diversity of backgrounds they represent, including race, ethnicity, age, income, gender, and sexual identity, in policy- and other decision-making positions. Our positions are shaped by our commitment to being nonpartisan and fact-based, and to acting with integrity. We strive for our work to be inclusive and intersectional, collaborating with diverse allies and coalitions to achieve equity for all.

My Trip to Australia and New Zealand A Struggle for Women's Rights



I recently returned from a five week tour of Australia and New Zealand and I learned of the struggle for women's rights, even Down Under. Kate Sheppard was the most prominent member of the women's suffrage movement in New Zealand. She and other women campaigned so effectively that in 1893 New Zealand became the first country in the world to grant the vote to all women. In later life she traveled to Britain and assisted the suffrage movement there. Sheppard is considered an important figure in New Zealand history.


Since 1991 her profile has been featured on the New Zealand 10 dollar

bill, replacing Queen Elizabeth. In 1993, a group of Christchurch women established the Kate Shepherd National Memorial on the banks of the Avon River. The group of women, with Sheppard in the middle, were

Our Membership Matters – Equal Pay Gap

In the U.S. we still struggle with inequality in the workplace and through AAUW, our national organization, we combine our efforts to try and level the playing field. So, it is that time once again to make our commitment to support AAUW in our continued efforts for equality. March was Equal Pay Day when women caught up to men. It marks the current state of the gender pay gap. The gap is 84% for full time workers and 77% for all workers. The date is based on the latest U.S. census figures showing that the average woman who works full time is paid on average just 84% of the typical man's pay. July 27th is the Equal Pay Day for black women who receive 67% of what men make. Our work continues through our national organization who lobbies in congress on our behalf to create change in these statistics. We still have high hopes for the passage of the Paycheck Fairness Act (H.R. 7/S. 205 in the 117 Congress) that is sponsored by U.S. Senator Patty Murray (D-Wash.) and U.S. Representative Rosa DeLauro (D-Conn.) that would help to close these punishing gaps by eliminating loopholes in the Equal Pay Act, helping to break harmful patterns of pay discrimination and strengthening workplace protections for women. It is a reasonable and comprehensive bill that would combat the wage discrimination that has plagued our nation for years. It languishes in Congress.

Your Membership Matters - New Dues Information

Our Branch board wants to make supporting these efforts as painless as possible. Since National had to raise their dues, our Board decided for this year to waive both our local dues and State dues if you mail in your renewal and pay by check by June 1st, a savings of \$21. If you pay after June 1st your membership renewal will be \$82. Our study groups are still going strong and Jean Wildgrube provided two important general meetings this past year: the CEO of Ellis Hospital spoke on the hospital merger and we were introduced to the Street Soldiers of Schenectady and the work they do helping the disadvantaged and Arlene Maranville set up luncheon. Both get togethers were well attended. I look forward to the coming year with renewed hope for a brighter future for all women and that our Branch continues to provide a social network for our members.
